FOR HALF A CENTURY,

WOMEN HAVE BEEN INTEGRAL TO THE FORD MUSTANG STORY

As customers, designers, race car drivers, engineers, marketers and journalists, women have been an integral part of the Ford Mustang story. The spirit of freedom and independence Mustang inspires has been embraced globally among women and men, the young and not so young, for over half a century.

Mustang has built a dedicated audience thanks to its authenticity. From the first retail customer to a successful race car driver to a journalist with a lifelong love for the pony car, these aficionada are but a tiny sample of the millions of women around the world whose stories have contributed to the iconic status of Ford Mustang.

Gail Wise, first-ever Mustang owner

In 1964, Gail Brown was a freshly graduated Chicago school teacher who made history when she became the first Mustang owner in America. She still owns the car today. What makes this example unique is that Wise bought her Mustang on April 15, two days before the car was set to go on sale. A mix-up at the dealer resulted in her making the very first retail purchase of a Mustang.

Today Wise recalls with a great deal of fondness those early days of Mustang ownership when she was a young teacher. "There was a middle school attached to our elementary, and the boys fawned over the Mustang," she remembers.

Mustang's competition history is ingrained in its performance DNA as the car achieved a class

victory in the 1964 Tour de France Automobile soon after its debut. While racing continues to be maledominated today, Lyn St. James is one of several prominent women competitors over the last 50 plus years who have been an important part of the Ford Mustang story.

After coming up through the Sports Car Club of America amateur ranks in the 1970s, St. James captured attention wielding Mustangs in the Trans Am and IM-SA GT classes, posting numerous victories and top-10 finishes. In the 1985 race at Watkins Glen, St. James became the first woman to win an IMSA GT race driving solo, a mark that still stands. She later went on to race in the Indianapolis 500 seven times, winning rookie of the year in 1992 and setting a closed-course world record of 225.722 mph in 1995.

Since retiring from the top ranks of American racing, St. James has been an advocate, mentor and coach for women in all sports, particularly racing, and still competes in vintage racing today.

"I'm a product of the muscle car era, and when I think about the muscle cars of the 1960s, like the Cutlass and the GTO, they aren't around anymore," said St. James. "Mustang has survived, flourishing with the same culture and heritage in the sense that it's still a muscle car, but upgraded to today's technology, and it's still hot." For 50 plus years, women have helped to establish the iconic status of Ford Mustang, and they will continue to be a part of the story for future generations.

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Down Under on Route 66

We know it by lots of names. The Mother Road, Will Rogers Highway, or even the Main Street of America. But in reality it's all just plain and simple - Route 66.

It's a piece of USA that's steeped in history, although in historic terms it's not really old. In European terms it wouldn't even be considered old enough to be historic. Even by new world standards it's almost modern.

So, what is that makes it arguably the most well know piece of road in the world? Robyn and I were first touched by its magic when we traveled from Santa Monica to Chicago as a sort of belated honeymoon. Our old '69 Mach I was still in restoration in Melbourne (still is actually! LOL) so Robyn suggested we hire a Mustang and travel Route 66 instead. Typically I took that one step further and suggested we buy our own Mustang... so we did! A 2007 Stillen Mustang, one of three supercharged V8's built by ex pat Kiwi Steve Millen in California.

The silver stallion, resplendent with deep cherry red roof and hood accent carried us from west to east and we were hooked... but we'd seen another Stillen as we left LA so we sold ours (Bruce & David Street now have that car safely in Christchurch) and purchased the 'gold ecstasy' yellow 2010 Stillen and shipped it to Chicago to do the return run with Bruce in his new car and another couple of interested friends.

We were starting to understand the attraction of finding new adventures and meeting new people by now and our friends on that trip certainly enjoyed it. Pretty soon friends of friends were asking about coming along, so we had another shot.


This time we flew to Baltimore to collect our Mustang (we'd also been exploring many other parts of USA by road as well) and met our latest group and their rental Mustangs in Chicago. Another great run with four Mustangs led to more enquiries and encouragement to open the tour up to a wider group and by the end of May 2017 we'd successfully run more trips including two tours back-to-back up and down the Mother Road with a total of 20 couples and/or mates.

There are plenty of tours that can take you on Route 66, some in the popular convertible Mustang, some in your own car but most are larger groups and often pretty expensive. We're just a small low key boutique tour with limited numbers that get us in to parts of mid America you wouldn't ever see. A good example is our friends in Illinois who once ran a gas station and now show visitors through the old station when they're rostered on as volunteers. What you won't normally see though are their Hot Roads that have won top awards across the states, just a few blocks away. When they welcome you into their home you start to understand how important this road was back then... and still is now... and you get to meet real Americans, not just the tourist attractions.

You'll come here to experience one of the most famous historic roads but you'll soon learn it's the people almost more than the road that really make the experience so special.

The most regular comment by the girls on our tour is "I'm doing this for 'John' as he really wanted to drive Route 66 but I didn't realise just how much more there was to see and do... it's not just been all driving and car museums, it's been a real highlight for me too".



Mustang Girls on Tour

Courtney Barber keeps on cruising in her Sixty-Five Road Warrior Mustang.

After many years of hard use the car was restored in 2015 and repowered with a 347 cu engine, four speed electronic automatic transmission, big disc brakes front and rear and upgraded suspension with rack and pinion steering. Wow.

Since then she has travelled roughly 50,000 miles in the car including a 13,337 mile road trip last year from South Carolina to Alaska and back in 30 days with her friend Amie Williams. The only casualties from the rough shingle roads were a broken rear shock absorber which took out a brake line and the accelerator pedal which came loose.

One Million Mile Mustang

This white 1966 289 Mustang has been driven daily and has clocked up one million miles in 50 years. The first owner was a travelling salesman who drove the car for seven years. Alan Anderson bought the car for \$900 from a Ford Dealer in 1972 and drove it for the next 18 years. He then gave the car to his son Victor, who has been driving it ever since around San Francisco. The car was rear ended, causing \$15,000 of damage, hit head on and had a front guard kicked in. Victor persevered with the car and it still looks great.

The body was restored in 2002-2003.

The original 289 V8 is still fitted. It's been overhauled every 250,000 miles, first in 1980, again in 1993 and finally in 2003. The original automatic transmission and differential are still fitted and have both been overhauled twice.

Fast Mustangs




