Time now to check the radiator for anti-freeze and check the heater to see it's working for those winter runs. See you there.



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The list of awards Chip has is staggering, including being inducted into the Hot Rod Hall of Fame in November 1997 at age 31, making him the youngest member ever inducted. In 1998 he was honored as the first recipient of the Good Guys Trendsetter Award and since 1999 he has won or been involved with the winners of seven of the prestigious AMBR (America's Most Beautiful Roadster) Awards. The awards and recognition keep on rolling in.

In January of 2000 Foose Wheels became a reality and in 2002 the documentary "**Rides**" was first aired. **A documentary**

When Peter and I first joined the Mustang Club, Peter wanted to paint his '66 Tiger Gold, fit it with wide tyres, mags wheels and lots of chrome. In other words he wanted to create a 'Restomod' Mustang. At this point in the evolution of Mustanging in NZ this was almost seen as heresy, with originality being seen as the critical factor at any Car Show or Convention.

Fortunately for those who like to create something a little different, and with help of high profile designers like Chip who dare to do step outside the square, today anything goes.

ence under his belt and had painted his first car, a Porsche 356. Chip's career profile is staggering working with a number of high profile motor industry companies in concept and design roles as well as continuing to work his father, designing and building street rods, customs, studio vehicles and show cars for films such as Blade Runner, Robo Cop, and Gone in 60 Seconds.

For the most of the 90's Chip worked with Boyd Coddington and was responsible for many internationally known vehicles such as: Roadster, Sportstar, Boydster I and II, and Boyd Air to name a few.

Foose Design came to life in 1998 specialising in illustration, graphics, ideation model making, surfacing and complete construction of automobiles and automotive related products. These products are available to private individuals, television, film and the automobile manufacturers.

This relationship has since expanded to a showcase of original Chip Foose "Cars" artwork at Disney Theme Parks and a role as a consultant on the sequel, "Cars 2".

In 2009, Chip made a return to television, serving as a guest judge on the Discovery Channel's "Ultimate Car Build-Off", where top auto shops in LA, Detroit and Atlanta competed for a chance at glory and a \$100,000 grand prize. Recently, he also hosted the documentary series "American Icon: The Hot Rod" on Discovery's HD Theater.

Along with his wife Lynne, Chip continues to run his business Foose Design, where he designs and builds automotive masterpieces. Chip has made his mark on several Mustangs during 'Overhaulin' shows and no doubt will continue to feature this iconic vehicle in years ahead.



Many of you had the opportunity to walk around the Cromwell Race Track in January while attending the Cromwell Car Show. The park was officially opened over Easter 2013. Peter and I had the opportunity to visit the track again in April and picked up a copy of their official opening programme. I thought the story of the Motorsport Park's beginnings and eventual opening as we see it today was inspiring, along with the story of Tony Quinn himself.

The Highlands Story

Once upon a time ... 1998 to be exact After an accident at the Queenstown Car Club's annual street race it became obvious that the club needed a different venue if it was to continue in the sport. Driven by the enthusiasm of Stuart McLean and Eric Swinbourne the Club set about finding a suitable piece of land to build a permanent motor racing circuit.

At that time the Cromwell Community Board owned a reserve that was deemed "unproductive land" with no plans to develop it. In 2002 five motor sport enthusiasts who didn't want to see the project falter, formed a new company Cromwell Motorsport Park Trust Ltd. They were Grant Aitken, lan Begg, Allan Dippie, Geoff Hunt and Jim Boult, who later sold his shareholding to Scott O'Donnell.

Under the new company the project began with the long process of resource consent which included hiccups and hurdles. With consent finally given the Directors moved ahead acquiring neighbouring restaurant and vineyard and set about planning the track and the facilities.

The scale of the project meant that progress was slow until early 2012 that is. Learning that the Australian pet food magnate Tony Quinn was in NZ looking at the possible purchase of Hampton Downs near Auckland, the directors invited him down and offered him a shareholding in the Company.

Tony could see the potential of a motorsport complex based on a new plan of club membership and a tourist operation.

After spending a day walking around the property and hearing the plans of the shareholders, Tony said he wasn't interested in being a shareholder—he wanted to buy the entire project.



And that was the start of a complex that has been created with almost bewildering speed, driven by the passion, attention to detail and hands on style of Tony Quinn, with his family right alongside.

The name Highlands was settled on early under Quinn ownership. Tony took one look at the harshly beautiful mountains surround Cromwell basin and decided it looked like the Highlands of his homeland in Scotland.

The result is much more than just a motor racing complex—its that of course, but it is also an upmarket club, a museum, a conference and convention centre, a restaurant and total adventure tourist attraction. Highlands started with a modest vision that has become bigger and bigger And it probably hasn't ended yet!

Who is Tony Quinn?

A Scotsman who lives in Australia, loves New Zealand... and a challenge! From small beginnings—born in Aberdeen, Scotland he lived with his parents and siblings in a wooden 'gypsy caravan' attached to the back of a bus. Tony's parents were in the pet food business and it was to this that he has returned after trying his hand at sign writing in his earlier days.

While on Holiday to NZ Tony saw the opportunities for the pet food business and established himself in the Dargaville area, however he relocated the business and his family to Queensland in 1994 and has since grown the business into an empire. With sufficient wealth he took up motor sport again specialising in Tarmac rallies, initially in Australian and then in NZ. His successes are many, including fives wins in the NZ event, four of them in the VIP Petfoods Nissan GTR on display in the museum.

The speed with which Highlands has happened and the quality of the place is a testament to the energy, drive and vision that Tony Quinn brings to his life. Why did he become involved in motor racing? He loves the challenge and the competition.

Tony pays tribute to those whose original vision saw the start of the Highlands Dream, the members of the Queenstown Car Club, those who followed and picked up the dream and saw it through the time consuming phase of resource consent. Well done for seeing it through and holding tight to their dreams so we can enjoy this fantastic racing facility.
