blighted by fire, near bankruptcies and other misfortunes - but today the Bealey Hotel lives on as a popular stopover for tourists heading to Arthur's Pass and the West Coast.

Meeting at West Melton Community Centre 25 Mustangs of all models gathered for the start.



Ford Mustang won't be the last ICE Pony car after all!! (internal combustion engine)

The arrival of the all-new, S650-generation Ford Mustang a historic occasion for a number of reasons, including the fact that the latest version of the iconic pony car is still sold without a single electrification option. While an EV Mustang seems inevitable at some point (not taking into account the Mustang Mach-E) Ford has said that a hybrid is actually more realistic, and noted that it plans to offer V8 power in that model as long as it possibly can. Meanwhile, the Chevy Camaro is going away – at least temporarily – and facing an uncertain future, and to this point, that was expected to be the case with the Dodge Challenger and Charger, too, as those models were seemingly destined to become EVs. However, a new report from *The Drive* indicates that the Ford Mustang may not be the last ICE-powered model of its kind, after all. Back in 2022, Dodge announced that it was making the move to all-electric power across its entire lineup, a revelation that was accompanied by the debut of the all-electric Charger Daytona SRT concept. In recent weeks, however, leaked photos of what is purported to be a next-generation Charger or Challenger with a transmission tunnel surfaced online, leading many to wonder – did Dodge have a change of heart?

Now, that seems to be precisely the case, as a source has informed *The Drive* that the next-gen Charger will in fact be sold not only with electric power, but also, the relatively new, twinturbocharged 3.0L I-6 Hurricane engine. "They're keeping gasoline engines. The official designation for the vehicle platform is LB and it will have the new GME-T6 Hurricane inline-six in RWD and AWD," the source said. "It will be using the Stellantis Gen 4 transmission that's also rolling out to Mack Assembly, Jefferson North Assembly, and Toledo North."





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2024 Ford Mustang wipes out at Drag Strip

The all-new, next-generation S650 2024 Ford Mustang debuted last September, but deliveries just began a few short weeks ago. Since then, we've seen lots of new pony cars out driving around, on dealer lots, and on the dyno, but inevitably, somebody was bound to get into an accident, as is always the case. The first involving an S650 technically happened back in April, though that was an RTR purpose-built drift car that crashed into a wall during a race. However, nearly one month ago, we saw a 2024 Ford Mustang GT pop up on Copart after a Hellcat driver reportedly smashed into it, totalling the poor pony car. Now, another 2024 Ford Mustang GT has crashed, but this time, it happened on the drag strip.



This particular 2024 Ford Mustang GT was racing a Cadillac CTS-V that appears to be heavily modified – given the presence of Weld wheels and big and little tires – which wasn't going very well as the Caddy leaped out to a considerable early lead. It's difficult to tell, as the camera stays with the Cadillac as it rockets by, but it seems as if the Mustang driver had some traction issues while heading down the track.

We say this because as the Cadillac crossed the finish line, we quickly see the Mustang cross into its lane, smash into the wall, and then drive up over it, at least partially. The video then cuts to the aftermath, which is pretty horrific to say the least – though it's precisely what one would expect from a high-speed, essentially head-on crash.

The poor 2024 Ford Mustang GT is clearly totalled after this accident, as both the front and passenger-side rear quarter are smashed in, one of the wheels is bent inward, and the airbags went off as well. Unfortunately for the owner, standard car insurance doesn't usually cover track mishaps either, so this might be a painful financial hit, to boot.

Supercars authorises changes to Mustang

This season has been a frustrating one for Australia's V8 Supercars series as it struggles to improve parity among teams, which is something that Ford has pushed for. This season, Chevrolet has dominated the series, which prompted a series of changes involving aerodynamic packages and revised engines, all with the intention of leveling the proverbial playing field. Regardless, FoMoCo's Ford Mustang Supercars team remained frustrated with the lack of transparency and sense of urgency in terms of improving parity, with Ford Performance head Mark Rushbrook even hinting that the automaker could exit Supercars altogether as a result. Now, just a few weeks after that potential bombshell dropped, Supercars has given Ford the green light to proceed with proposed aerodynamics changes aimed at leveling the playing field, according to *Motorsport*.

Ford's Supercars team will be allowed to make changes to the rear wing, side skirt, and front fascia of its Mustang racers, changes that are designed to reduce drag and shift more downforce to the rear of the vehicle. This update stems from the second parity review of the current Supercars season, as well as the result of the Bathurst 1000, in which the Camaro racers were far quicker around the track than their pony car counterparts.

"After a comprehensive evaluation conducted by Supercars, and in consultation with the Homologation Teams, it has been determined that adjustments will be implemented to the Ford Mustang Vehicle Specification Document in preparation for the Boost Mobile Gold Coast 500 event," organizers said in a statement. "These modifications include alterations to the rear wing, side skirt, and front fascia elements, with the primary aim of reducing drag, and redistributing downforce to the rear of the Mustang." However, it seems as if The Blue Oval doesn't believe that these changes will be enough to close the competitive gap between it and the Camaro

"Ahead of the Boost Mobile Gold Coast 500, Supercars has approved changes only to the aerodynamics of the Mustang GT Supercar, which will continue to leave Ford teams at a disadvantage this weekend," the automaker said in a statement. "DJR established that a parity deficit existed using the process outlined in the Supercars Parity Review System. Through the available vehicle and timing data, DJR established a lap time deficit of 0.42s per lap compared to the Camaro at Mount Panorama. According to simulations, combining the proposed aerodynamic and engine changes would have resulted in a total lap time reduction of 0.308 seconds, bringing the total deficit down to 0.112 seconds per lap. However, with Supercars only approving the aerodynamic update, Ford teams will remain at a larger disadvantage this weekend. Ford and its teams welcome Supercars announcement that they are expanding their parity methods and tools. We hope this expansion allows for the achievement of true technical parity, a cornerstone of the series."
















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A members story Richard, Glenda & Skye Crawford



TATe are Richard and Glenda Crawford, this is our Mustang story.

On a grey June day in 1993, I went to see Dennis Phillips, well known in the Mustang club as an original member, at his car yard that was in Papanui Road. At the time he had 3 Mustangs for sale, a 69 sportsroof that needed paint, a 68 Fastback with faded red paint and a 65-66 notch that was more affordable for me at that time.

As it turns out, the 69 Sportsroof was sold, and the notch....well, wasn't what I really wanted. I took the 68 out for a test drive, this was my first time driving a left hand drive and can't say it was fun but I was hooked and so within a few weeks the dull red 68 Mustang Fastback with a 289 and C4 was mine. I spent time polishing up the old paint and considering it didn't look bad at all. It was still covered in small chips and dings but who cares it's a Mustang.

This car started its life in Highland Green, just like Steve McQueen's Bullitt movie car and came into New Zealand in 1969 maybe through the Deep freeze operation, but not really sure. Written off running from the Police



We've certainly seen our fair share of Ford Mustang involved crashes and police chases over the years – and for the most part, they rarely end well. Whether they crash into other cars while street racing, smash into poles when trying to drift, crash while leaving a cars and coffee meet, or smash into other stolen vehicles, there are many hours of footage of these types of antics all over the internet. Now, we can add yet another clip to that collection, as a Ford Mustang driver recently crashed their pony car when trying to evade police on Highway 101 in Sonoma County.

According to the California Highway Patrol, the driver of this Ford Mustang — which humorously has a custom license plate that says "Will Run" — was speeding in Rohnert Park when law enforcement attempted to pull them over. Rather than complying, the driver instead chose to speed off, confirming that their actions do in fact line up with the statement made by their license plate.


Once on the highway, the Mustang driver hit speeds in excess of 100 miles-per-hour as they attempted to flee police, at which point the ground units backed off and let a helicopter take over. It wasn't long before the chase ended abruptly, however, as the driver lost control when trying to pass another vehicle at high speed in the centre median, causing major damage to the poor pony car.

Amazingly, the 18-year-old Ford Mustang driver only suffered minor injuries, as was the case with the occupants of the Land Rover that he smashed into. However, facing multiple felony charges, it doesn't seem as if he'll be attempting to outrun the police again anytime soon, though this apparently wasn't his first time doing so – it was just his first time getting caught.


A contingent of 8 cars represented CMOC at the Auckland Convention. Every body left for the long drive at various times during the lead up week allowing a few days at least for the journey. There were 147 registrants and 160 Mustangs although these number swelled to approximately 200 Mustangs as non-registered attendees committed to parking in the outdoor display. The cars that were going to be judged were parked inside the venue by 6.00pm. I must say that there were some serious competitors, car cleaning, including removal of wheels and the use of cosmetic brushes was taking place in the hotel car parks and continued when the cars were parked inside the venue.

Friday night was a mix n mingle get together in the Sir Noel Robinson Room, with platters and a cash bar. It was a good night to catch up with old contacts or become acquainted with some new folk from around the country.

The show opened to the public on Saturday at 10.00am, earlier at 9.00am volunteers from each club were organised into teams of 3 for the judging, each team judged approximately 8 Mustangs so that the judging was over by midday. This was my first experience of judging, although I was the recorder rather than the assessor, I thought it a rather subjective examination, but I learnt a lot about what is required, and I now know why all those people were taking their wheels off!! I also now understand why some members even take their cars to the show in a trailer!!







The show was well organised and set up by Auckland with many vendors stands offering all sorts of Mustang related products and services from merchandise and car cleaning products to tyres and insurance cover. The public attendance was disappointing and I think given that this is Auckland, the biggest population centre in the country, everyone was mystified as to the reasons for this.

Saturday evening was another casual dining night, Tacos and Bao Buns in the Sir Noel Robinson Room. Given the busy day with the show I think most people were keen for an early night although I know there were a few exceptions.
