I was guest speaker at the monthly club night of the Californian Mustang Owners Club on 20th June, NZ time. Technology is a wonderful thing and I was on a big screen via Zoom. GENERAL BUSINESS

1. Garry Jackson President of the FoMC (Federation of Motoring Clubs) outlined the makeup of the organisation's membership comprising 149 clubs representing the interests of owners of some 370,000 vehicles.

He advised that the NZ historic and classic survey had been completed and it was significant that the membership represented a \$16.5 billion market.

One of the key issues they were dealing with at the moment was the implementation of 12-month warrants for vehicles over 40 years old.

2. The President informed the members that in light of the governments review of the incorporated societies rules and regulations to be implemented in 2026 it will be necessary for the committee to employ the services of a legal professional versed in the new laws to review the club's constitution and there will some cost to be incurred for this.

- **3. Peter Watt** asked why members/volunteers were required to pay an entrance fee to the clubs All Ford Day event. The President advised that this was how it had always been but agreed that the committee would ensure that there was a clear communication in this regard in the future. It was suggested that members only be charged if they actually enter the car show. The President advised that the committee would determine this and advise members accordingly.
- **4. A member** queried how the yearbook ended up costing more than the previous Burble News when one of the reasons for discontinuing the News was the cost. Brian Mills pointed out this was not quite correct when you took into account the advertising revenue which was \$1,400 higher with \$500 still to come, he accepted however that he had incurred approximately \$2,000 in extra cost to print an extra 100 yearbooks with the intention of using them as a promotional tool over the next year, this has not worked out so would not be repeated next year.

To ensure that members would be informed about future costs and give them the opportunity to express any views regarding the future of the yearbook, it was moved that the yearbook be published in the same format for 2024.

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A message from Garry Jackson President of FoMC

Incorporated Societies Act 2022

At the 2022 AGM, we gave early advice of the preliminary notice and advised of the new Incorporated Societies Act 2022, and the very early information available at that time. We advised our intention was to provide guidance to Clubs on this. At this early time, we explicitly highlighted that our role would be *quidance*, and that we were not, and would not be, providing instruction or specific advice on what actions Clubs may need or want to take to meet the requirements of the legislation. We emphasised that such initiatives were the responsibility of Clubs, at their own discretion. We also indicated that the situation was still evolving, with aspects of the early legislation yet to be confirmed in subsequent updates.

At the 2023 AGM, we took the subject one stage further with an interactive live stream presentation from subject matter experts Parry Field Lawyers, who presented the core points of the legislation as it was at that time, and what it meant (in general terms) for volunteer clubs such as ours. Parry Field also advised that further legislation was expected, which would add or clarify further detail and requirements to the 2022 Act (for Clubs to meet by April 2026). At the 2023 AGM, we indicated that FoMC would establish a small working group to pursue the details as they emerge, and to explore ways that FoMC could fulfil its guiding role to Clubs.

Since June 2023, the Working Group has attended several webinars run by Parry Field and looked into Constitution requirements for Clubs.

As a result of the subsequent updating Act in October 2023, it has now become clear that the new Act requires a much higher level of Committee responsibility and "formality" than the old Act. Committee members need to be formally aware of the governance responsibilities that they will be responsible for as a managing committee. This includes understanding record keeping, data security and disciplinary requirements. It is interesting to note that Parry Field, and many other legal firms, have now published detailed Q&A and other applicable advice resources on-line, responding to enquiries from clubs and other affected parties to a level that surpasses anything that the FoMC can offer or provide with our voluntary resources.

As such, the FoMC now realises that we are not

able to offer the guidance we originally envisaged for the following reasons:

- 1. We don't have the necessary professional knowledge to offer this guidance.
- 2. There are other and better sources of such information.

Our member clubs are too varied in terms of both size and club make up to offer a single level of guidance (e.g. we have national clubs, regional clubs, clubs with multiple branches, etc).

We can advise the following:

- Clubs that are currently Incorporated will remain so until April 2026 under the old Act.
- Clubs that intend to remain Incorporated will need to register their new Constitution by April 2026 with the Registrar.
- Clubs need to determine individually whether they wish to remain an Incorporated Society or not under the new Act.
- The FoMC doesn't require member Clubs to be an Incorporated Society.

Clubs should take independent advice on this, and many lawyers are offering information packs and Q and A services on their websites.

In setting out the foregoing points, as President I sincerely apologise that we didn't achieve the original objective to provide guidance to member clubs.

I urge Member Clubs to seek their own advice regarding the full suite of details now available, and to make their own decisions accordingly, just as the FoMC itself will need to do. I will talk to this subject in a little more detail at our AGM May 26

The Federation recommends Parry Field's "Incorporated Societies Information Hub", providing a wealth of resources (including informative videos)

A number of member clubs have already engaged Parry Field, with positive feedback.

Other professional organisations are also providing advice and assistance to some member clubs.

All of this is consistent with an earlier note that I sent to all Clubs as nominations opened for the FoMC Executive for the year ahead, and my encouragement for candidates to step forward. The Federation is heading into interesting times, and in my view it's time for us to change down a gear, line up the road ahead, and put our foot down for the great road ahead!





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The Little River Inn—the history



By the mid 1870's, Little River was a community of some 400 people, firmly divided between those who had become tired of having to travel to the Beach Hotel in Birdlings Flat for their tipple, and those who feared a licenced premises in Little River would create an unprecedented crime wave.

Things began to tip in favour of the tipplers on December 23rd, 1876, when Mr. R.D. Allen promoted his site as being ideal for a hotel, having, as it did, "unequalled frontages, with yards and stables". The opportunity was snapped up by Mr. J.F. Stanbury, who duly set about building his accommodation house in the face of strong opposition from the Good Templars and the Māori community, only to be denied a licence in June of 1877. Undaunted, Mr Stanbury pressed on. On the third attempt, a licence was duly granted to Mr. J. Olphert, and the Forsyth Arms Hotel opened its doors on 31st December 1877 with a widely advertised "Grand Dinner and Ball".

That original timber building was later expanded, and served the community for almost eighty years, through wars and economic downturns, before succumbing to old age. The

anticipated crime wave failed to eventuate (apart, perhaps, from the occasional assault, a few thefts and the murder of a "Russian Finn" in 1887)

The 1950's was known more for practicality than for design flair, and the proposed new structure was a double-skinned concrete block building, with a concrete tile roof. It survived internal modifications, and the Christchurch earthquakes of 2010-2011, but after almost 70 years was showing its age. The present incarnation has removed internal supporting walls to the bar area, and replaced them with engineered steel beams. The forty tonne tile roof has been replaced with colour steel, and the block walls plastered. New toilets have been added, fire protection upgraded, double glazed windows added, and wall and ceiling insulation installed. A wood-fired boiler provides heating and hot water, and the new kitchen is intended to be chef-friendly. The new name, Little River Inn, is intended to reflect the new focus of the hotel, and the hope that it will serve the community, and visitors to Banks Peninsula, for another 70 vears.



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On Friday 17th May a beautiful sunny day a few cars met at the Wigram Air Force Museum ready for the run south to Omarama for the Mainalnd Muster this year organised by the Southern Club.

We travelled down through the inland route through Geraldine stopping for lunch at the Silverstream Hotel in Kimbell where two more cars joined the convoy.

We arrived in Omarama about 3.00pm, after a stop off at the Pukaki Dam for a photo opportunity, where we checked in to the Hotel and registered for the weekend. 22 cars from Canterbury and 10 from Southern.

There was a good dinner that night where everyone caught up with each other and the first paper bag auction was held.

On Saturday morning the interclub challenge was held where some blindfolded puzzle games were played with two teams of four from each club. The highlight of the challenge was the drag racing event where everyone was asked to bring a matchbox car and race it on the hot-wheels track. After all the points were added up Canterbury Club came away with the trophy for another year.

Then it was off on a run over the Benmore Dam where there was another photo opportunity.


The run finished in Kurow where a lovely lunch was organised at the Waitaki Braids Cafe.

Saturday night was the tartan themed night where all sorts of weird and wonderful costumes were worn. Another fabulous dinner and another paper bag auction. The night was also celebrated with Colin Sweetman's significant birthday with a cake that was a copy of his car. By this time it was snowing fairly heavy which was beautiful sight. A bunch of ladies thought it would be a great idea to be snow angels lying out in the snow waving their arms around getting wet and cold. It was a great night.

Next morning it was breakfast with farewells amongst the several inches of snow. There was much discussion among everyone on the best way home. It was another great weekend away at the Muster, they never fail to disappoint. Canterbury's turn next year I'm sure it will be just as successful.

Sunday breakfast revealed all: "snow – bunny" stories; weather and road forecasts; interclub prize champions (go Canterbury, with our win in the drag racing clinching our victory, thanks to Dave Bannan (first placing), Gary Neil (second) and Shelley Williams (third), a complete lockout); our own Cerry Johnstone and Susan Johnstone Lord winning publican's choice; and Bob announcing that a total of \$3600 for the First Responders had been

raised, thanks to \$1600 from the auctions and two anonymous donations.

As always, from the breakfast it was time to hit the road home. I was one of the first to leave (after clearing big snow on the Mustang), choosing the certainty of a clear road through Kurow and Waimate versus the uncertainty of Tekapo and Burkes Pass. 4 hours 30 minutes to Amberley, surprisingly only 10 minutes longer than the trip south ... new options and choices for future trips, and the chance for a repeat visit to Valli Wines!






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








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Buller All Ford Day 1st-3rd June 2024





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

ustangers are extremely social creatures! We enjoy the company of others and the camaraderie of our Mustang clubs wherever they are located. As a Senior Captain operating the Boeing 787 for a major airline, I visit countries all over the world. During my layovers,

I enjoy approaching Mustang owners and engaging them in conversation about their cars and their local Mustang clubs.

The idea of becoming an International Mustang Ambassador came naturally to me when I first contacted Martin Daniel, a member of the Mustang Club of Australia. Martin owns a gorgeous 1972 Mach 1 with right-hand-drive. After interviewing Martin, our club president Craig Cunningham and I produced the first-ever-of-its-kind "Trans-Pacific Zoom Meeting." Martin was our guest speaker and made his debut via an 8,698-mile connection over Zoom from Tasmania, Australia, to a full house of Mustang Owners Club of California members in Van Nuys. Our club was elated to have him as guest speaker.

During our meeting, we discussed right-hand-drive Mustangs and Martin's club activities. We asked him where his car was built and where it was converted from left- to righthand-drive. The meeting was fabulous with questions and answers from both sides of the Pacific Ocean. After exchanging information, ideas, club events, and awards, our friendships were sealed and welded together by the unbreakable bonds of Mustang steel, chrome, glass, fabric, and rubber in the span of 30 minutes.

Singapore has always been an incredible country with lush history, incredible food, and people dedicated to their Mustangs! There, I met with the Mustang Owners Club of Singapore President Ansar Mansoor. I had quite the education about Mustang ownership in Singapore where there are over 100 Mustangs.

At this time, you should sit down to prevent injury to yourself and others. If you want to purchase a new 2024 Mustang Dark Horse in Singapore, you would have to have the Mustang delivered to the Singaporean government's automotive laboratory where the engine would be tested for emissions and safety tests. Afterwards, you would apply for a Certificate of Entitlement with 10 years of fees costing \$106,000. Finally, you could have the vehicle delivered with a balance of roughly \$207,000-\$400,000 USD. Used and late-model Mustangs sell for no less than \$109,000. A 1964½ Mustang, for instance, sold for 1,100,000 SGD, the local currency in Singapore, which, when converted, equals \$819,566 USD. I think that I prefer the prices stateside much better.

We also visited the former Ford Factory Museum where Ford produced vehicles from 1941 until 1942 when the Japanese took over the facility. I look forward to attending some of Singapore's Mustang club events soon and will report back...

My next international adventures took place in Auckland, New Zealand, where there are five Mustang clubs on the northern island and two in the South Island. I contacted Craig Borland, the President of the Auckland Mustang Owners Club, and we scheduled a club meeting at the Royal New Zealand Yacht Squadron where the America's Cup and other International Sailboat Awards are proudly displayed. We showcased five AMOC Mustangs with the beautiful high-span Ngapipi Bridge and the Pacific Ocean in the background. Afterwards, we enjoyed a wonderful lunch over a 5,656-mile phone call with MOCC President Craig Cunningham. With a rainbow nearby, we found what is truly important in Mustang circles: the friendships across tremendous distances and oceans.

When I reached out to the Canterbury Mustang Owners Club from Christchurch, New Zealand, in December 2023, little did I know just how stimulating this experience would be for myself, my kids Michael and Anushka, and the CMOC club members. First, I spoke with club president Ray van Hamelsveld who set up an impromptu flash mob of Mustang enthusiasts at a gorgeous stone church in Tai Tapu. We had ten Mustangs sprawled across the church's lawn. Some were early and some late models, and some looked as if they had just come off the production line.





I recorded all of our participants' interviews, vividly capturing the history of their origins in the USA and their migrations to their current homes in the Lands-Down-Under. One of the members of this club even owns a Mustang which was destined for Japan. This car's signage, documentation, and decals are all written in Japanese. Our brothers and sisters in New Zealand truly know hospitality, and we were kindly received at a local pub for delicious food and drinks. Not long afterwards, we took a leisurely drive back into town, and one of the gentlemen graciously allowed my son to drive his Mustang for a while on the left side of the road.

In January, I returned to New Zealand to visit the Canterbury Mustang Owners Club for a "Posh Picnic" at the Broadoak Gardens with owners Claire and Shaun Maloney, who love classic British automobiles and the CMOC. The ladies from CMOC prepared the most splendid home-made lunches which we shared between 42 people who drove their 18 Mustangs. Once we finished our lunches, we strolled along the gardens which led us to the owner's collection of classic Jaguar and British automobiles. One of these vehicles even participated at a race at Le Mans. The experience was breathtaking. We finished our outing with a drive through the countryside around Christchurch, ending at a restoration shop called The Mustang Center which specializes in Mustang restoration. The Mustang Center is the only parts store Down-Under and they are well worth a visit. Team Hutchenson Ford and Avon City Ford are the only Ford dealerships in Christchurch that sell new Mustangs. However, they do not stock parts or support the earlier Mustangs.
















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10 Pin Bowling 6th June 2024



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Ford Benchmarks Rival's Sport Sedan, a Potential Four Door Mustang Foe (Ford Authority)

Pord stopped offering sedans in its home market several years ago, instead opting for lifestyle vehicles like the Ford Bronco, Ford Bronco Sport, and Ford Maverick. So it's always interesting to find clear evidence that the automaker is interested in benchmarking a particularly notable performance sedan, considering it offers nothing that can directly compete with it. And although its sighting at this time is likely a complete coincidence, it comes not long after Ford CEO Jim Farley indicated the company could produce a four door Mustang.

As made abundantly clear by these photos, the vehicle in question is the Cadillac CT4-V Blackwing, the flagship high performance sedan from Lincoln's crosstown rival. It's powered by a twin-turbo 3.6L V6 engine rated at 472 horsepower and 445 pound-feet or torque, mated to a standard six-speed manual transmission. A Ford-derived 10-speed automatic transmission is optional. Either way, the Blackwing is solely offered as a rear-wheel drive model, although all-wheel drive is available on other CT4 trim levels.

Cadillac's CT4-V Blackwing carries an official o-60 mile per hour figure of 3.9 seconds with its six-speed manual and a \$63,590 MSRP. Those figures place it squarely in line with the Ford Mustang Dark Horse Premium, which has a \$62,930 price tag assuming dealers don't mark them up. The Dark Horse features a slightly more powerful variant of the 5.0L Ford V8 Coyote, rated at 500 horsepower and 418 pound-feet of torque. Ford doesn't pub-

lish official 0-60 figures, but the Dark Horse can likely give the Blackwing a run for its money with the right person behind the wheel. In this particular instance, it appears the automaker is directly benchmarking the Cadillac against a Ford Mustang GT Premium convertible.

The big question about this sighting centers on Ford's potential plans to offer a four door Mustang sedan. Ford CEO Jim Farley very recently suggested a four door sedan variant could happen, a comment that did not go unnoticed by enthusiasts. While it remains unclear if such a vehicle will ever make it to production, the Mustang family has certainly expanded in recent years, most notably with the Mustang Mach-E electric crossover. Additionally, Ford's announcement that its entire retail lineup in the United States will offer hybrid options by 2030 guarantees that a Mustang hybrid is on the way. Farley basically said as much when he stated that Ford Performance is currently evaluating hybrid powertrains, which itself is a sign that partially electric power has a place in the company's motorsports portfolio.

Either way, a four door Mustang would likely compete against the revived Dodge Charger lineup. The upcoming sedan and coupe will be sold as fully electric models, although gasoline powered variants will be introduced in 2025. With the Chevy Camaro officially out to pasture, the CT4-V Blackwing and the rest of the CT4 lineup are essentially GM's most direct Ford Mustang rivals.





2024 Ford Mustang Earns 5-Star NHTSA Safety Rating (Ford Authority)

The Ford Mustang hasn't always enjoyed a reputation for being the safest vehicle on the road, though that isn't necessarily the fault of the vehicle itself. Rather, the pony car's performance and sporty nature has previously helped rank it on some unsavoury lists such as the vehicles on U.S. roads with the highest driver death rates by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). However, the all-new, S650generation 2024 Ford Mustang has now earned a very high honour from that same organization.

That honour is a five-star safety rating from the NHTSA, which is the highest score possible. The 2024 Ford Mustang achieved that status with five-star ratings in virtually every measurable in that specific testing, including front driver and passenger side crash testing, front seat combined side barrier and pole ratings, driver side barrier, overall side pole, and rollover results.

The 2024 Ford Mustang scored four stars in

rear seat and rear passenger categories for the combined side barrier and pole ratings, as well as side barrier test results, however. These tests involve a simulated head-on collision between two similar vehicles at 35 milesper-hour, an intersection collision between two vehicles at 38.5 mph, crashing into a rigid pole at 20 mph, and a rollover resistance test.

As Ford Authority previously reported, The Blue Oval has worked to make the Ford Mustang safer in recent years by adding an array of features as standard equipment for the 2021 model year. That list included Ford Co-Pilot360, which consists of Auto High-Beam Headlamps, BLIS (Blind Spot Information System), Lane-Keeping System Keeping Assist, Lane-Keeping Alert, and Driver Alert), and Pre-Collision Assist with Automatic Emergency Braking (AEB), which includes Pedestrian Detection, Forward Collision Warning, Dynamic Brake Support, and Rain-Sensing Wipers.







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
